Dear Parishioners,

Be assured of my prayers and best wishes to all of our students and teachers at the start of this new school year. I believe West Baton Rouge Parish Schools and Holy Family School have their first day on Wednesday, while St. John the Evangelist School begins on Friday of this week. I pray it will be a great year of learning and renewing friendships for all of our parishioners.

Our Christian Formation classes also resume this month, beginning with the 11th grade Confirmation Class which meets next Sunday, August 12. Registration for all other grades will take place next weekend, August 11-12, immediately following each of our Masses. Our Parent Meeting for all grades is scheduled for Monday, August 13, at 6:30 p.m. in the Activity Center. Religion classes for children in grades 1-10 are set to begin on Monday, August 20, Tuesday, August 21, or Wednesday, August 22.

The schedule is slightly different this year in that we are moving 5th and 6th grade classes to Wednesday evenings. This will allow them to start class at 5:15 p.m. rather than at 7:00 p.m. as in the past. Please consider volunteering to serve as a catechist on Mondays, Tuesdays, or Wednesdays, and please pray for all of our students, parents, and teachers.

Our R.C.I.A. process for people interested in joining the Catholic Church also starts back up this month. We have an Open House planned for Wednesday, August 22, at 6:30 p.m. in the rectory. Please invite your relatives, friends, or neighbors who may have expressed an interest in learning more about the Catholic faith or who wish to join the Church. Refreshments will be served as we distribute information on the upcoming classes.

I will be leading a "Back to School" Retreat for all of our diocesan seminarians on Monday and Tuesday of this week. Our seminarians have been involved in various ministry assignments this summer, and the retreat will give the new and returning seminarians a chance to meet one another and grow closer to God. Notre Dame Seminary and St. Joseph Seminary College both begin classes on August 20.

Wednesday, August 15, is the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary and a holyday of obligation. We will celebrate our regular 8:00 a.m. Mass that morning and then an evening Mass at 6:00 p.m. in honor of the feast day. Holy Family Parish in Port Allen has a vigil Mass on Tuesday evening if it works better with your schedule. Holydays sometimes involve sacrifice on our part but we know that such sacrifices also bring blessings to our lives.

We finally closed out the books on the 2017-2018 fiscal year so I will try to provide an overview of our income and expenditures as soon as possible, hopefully by next week. I do not wish for money to be the focus of too many articles or talks but you do need to be kept informed of both our blessings and challenges. We had a blessed year financially last year so I thank God for his goodness and for the great tradition of community support here in Brusly.

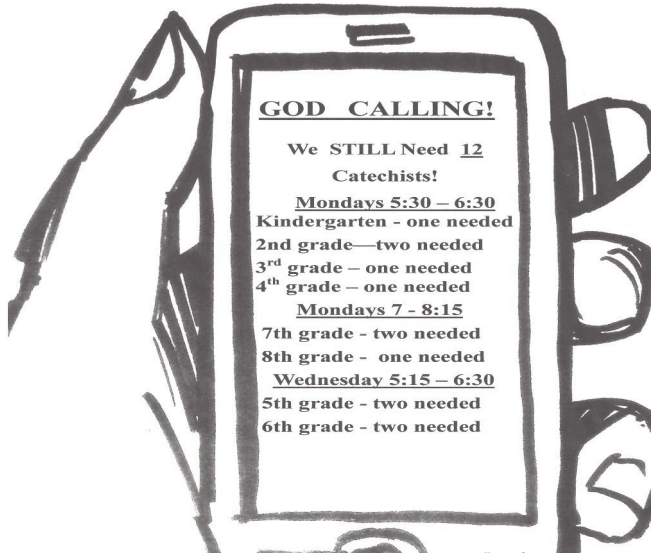

18th Sunday in Ordinary Time

In an on-demand society, it's not always easy to imagine life with less. The crowds of Jesus' day depended on the weather and successful growing seasons for their livelihood. For many of Jesus' listeners, even "food that perishes" would have been a welcome relief. Jesus acknowledges this but tries to draw them deeper. "You are looking for me not because you saw signs but because you ate the loaves and were filled." For people who have just witnessed a miracle, the response is strangely marked by ingratitude. "What can you do? Our ancestors ate manna in the desert." Jesus fed them for one day, but Moses interceded with God for 40 years of bread. "Jesus," they seem to say, "can't you just give us more?"

How often do we behave similarly in the spiritual life? "If I only I had more patience, then I could be kind to her." "I could be welcoming if I was more outgoing, but that's just not me." "I know I'd be a better parent if I just had more time." Like the crowds, we want Jesus to give us more. We always don't want him to completely shift our paradigm. Perhaps it's not "more patience" we need, but a deeper sense of our own imperfections for a greater sense of empathy. Maybe God is inviting you not to entertain an entire group, but to seek out the quiet person on the fringe. And time may limit you from family engagement, but could God be asking you to reorder your priorities entirely?

After all, it wasn't more loaves that the people needed. Jesus is "the bread of life," who sustains our most essential needs. This week, are you looking for more or are you looking for God Himself?
