Emergency calls answered as soon as possible. Communion calls to homebound weekly by request. Please notify the office if someone is homebound.



Dear Parishioners,

Those who cook understand the value salt plays in cooking. I don't think anyone really enjoys the food that has either too much or too little salt. And if the food has the right proportion of salt, nobody even thinks about salt. When Jesus used the symbol of salt, he must have meant it as a great compliment. So, when someone tells us, "You are the salt of the earth", the person is emphasizing our usefulness and worth. Salt has many qualities. It is the product of the sun and the sea. The Romans considered it as the purest of all things. So, when Jesus used the example of salt, he must have meant that his followers should be models of purity. The second quality of salt is that it preserves. People of ancient times used salt as a preservative. Even today, in some third world countries, those who cannot afford a refrigerator use salt as a preservative to keep edible things from decaying. Salt, in fact, prevents rotting and decay. By using the example of salt, Jesus also meant that his followers should be like salt to our world, to preserve it from spoiling because of greed, injustice, lust, and to preserve it from decaying because of dishonesty, disloyalty and disrespect. Thirdly, salt flavors. It brings taste to food and without salt, food is insipid. We are all called to bring flavor to Christian life through our values of love, forgiveness, understanding and acceptance; otherwise our lives can be useless. Christians are called to be the salt of the earth.

Jesus also said, "You are the light of the world". The function of the light is to shine or to illuminate. Light is to be seen. A Christian life should not to be hidden, but it should shine forth so that others may see the goodness in our lives. A mother and her small child once drove past the restored home of Abraham Lincoln in Springfield. It was at night, and the light of the national shrine of the United States was brightly lit. Seeing the light inside the house, the little child excitedly said, "Look Mama, Mr. Lincoln left the lights on." The mother smiled, "Yes, he left them on for the world to see." Although Lincoln has been dead since 1865, he still is a tremendous inspiration to all people. Light can also guide us. It warms up, removes fear, and it shows us the path. Christians are called to assume leadership. This leadership is not to boss or criticize others, but to follow the great light of Jesus, so that through us others can experience the true light. We are called to be the light of the world, illuminating our homes and communities with truth, justice and peace, and to guide the world along the way with the light of Christ. Blessed Mother Theresa left a comfortable life in a European cloister to work among the poorest in India. She did it not with the intention of being a good example to others, but out of love for Jesus, and in the process became a light to the world.

Moreover, our being salt and light to the world must be an answer to the particular needs of our time. We must be salt in preserving the world from becoming more and more corrupt, through injustices done to others. We need to be the light dispelling the darkness of greed and selfishness which drive millions hungry, naked and homeless. The Lord's appeal through Isaiah the Prophet, "Share your bread with the hungry, shelter the homeless and clothe the naked," still resounds today, maybe louder than ever. And while we serve the world as its salt, and shine as the light of Christ, we are met with opposition from those who prefer to live in darkness, and refuse to come closer to the light. It might sting like salt in an open wound, but we should not be discouraged, for we are doing God's work and relying chiefly on the power of the Spirit. St. Paul found success through the power of the Spirit. In the second reading, we heard St. Paul say, "I did this so that your faith should not depend on the human philosophy, but on the power of God." "God from God, light from light," is the power on which we need to depend in serving people as a shining beacon and as salt to the earth. Pray today to deepen your faith in Christ so that we can function as salt and light.


