Dear Parishioners,

Sometimes it seems that God should make a sudden descent to this earth, and with a sickle cut down all the evil weeds from our society. We would love to have a perfect society: free of evils, problems and difficulties. Unfortunately, that is not happening. Why? The first reading of the book of Wisdom says, "God gives people good grounds for hope and He permits repentance for their sins." And the Gospel tells us, "God is patient." He respects our freedom. For Him, freedom is a precious gift, and it tolerates evil, at least until the day of judgment. Since He respects our freedom, He will not force anyone to avoid evil and do good; but He gives us enough time to repent for our sins and change our lives.

The Gospel of this weekend tells us of the parable of weeds among the wheat. The sower sowed good seeds in the field, and an enemy sowed weeds among the wheat. Jesus compares the Kingdom of God with the one who sowed the wheat in the field, and then an enemy comes along and sows weeds in the same field. The wheat and the weeds both sprout, and the workers bring this to the farmer's attention. It is interesting to note the manner in which the farmer reacts to this information. Instead of venting his anger at the enemy, he advises his workers to let both wheat and weeds grow together for fear that in uprooting the weeds, they might damage the wheat. He stated that at the harvest time they could separate the wheat and the weeds; the wheat can be stored in the barn and the weeds could be burned. God is one who fully recognizes our weaknesses and deals with us wisely, gently and with forbearance.

We see that in our society both good and evil coexist. We know that as long as our human nature is tainted by sin, we cannot look for a perfect society, perfect family, or a perfect Church. A perfect humanity or society never existed, and will never exist. Good and bad will always coexist, just like wheat and weed. This doesn't mean that we must be indifferent to evil and allow it to continue. Our attitude toward evil should not be one of passivity or indifference. When we remain passive and indifferent in the face of evil, then we are guilty of perpetuating it. However, the worst thing one could do in the face of evil is to run away from it. So, the Lord is calling us to do our bit to remove evil wherever we can, and if we can't, at least protest against it. Instead of cursing the darkness, he is calling us to light a candle.

Though we come across good and evil every day, we should not lose heart. Instead of bowing down our head in despair and discouragement, we have to boldly confront the evil in and around us with good. At the same time we have to be patient, as the sower was patient with the weeds. We have to follow the message of Jesus. He is not like a political or military leader who tries to eliminate an enemy. God's way is different, as expressed in today's responsorial psalm, "Lord, you are good and forgiving." We are fortunate that God is forgiving. Even in the Church, which by definition is holy, we experience sinfulness and scandals. There are weeds in the fields of the Church. But should we be surprised about it? Even among the twelve apostles chosen by Jesus, one of them was a traitor. Jesus could have eliminated Judas because of the evil he was going to do. However, this was only in his thought or in his mind, and he didn't pull up the weed, which was Judas, from among the wheat, which was the other disciples. Think of us, who in this world is sinless? Who is pure wheat with no mixture of weeds? Do we want God to take us away from this world to face him in judgment, when the field of our lives still contains weeds? Let us pray today for the grace that we may not run away from evil, but face it patiently, and that we may experience the compassionate and forgiving love of God in our lives.




