Dear Parishioners,

During World War II, John Howard was blinded in an airplane explosion and could not see a thing for the next twelve years. One day as he was walking down the street near his parents' home in Texas, he suddenly began to see "red sand" in front of his eyes. Without warning, he regained his sight. According to an eye specialist, the blood blocking his optic nerve caused by the explosion, had cleared. Commenting on this experience John said, "You don't know what it is like for a father to see his children for the first time." But something more spectacular happened in today's Gospel, for Christ conferred to the blind man, not only physical sight, but spiritual sight as well. Jesus was so kind to open his inner eyes of faith and radiate his own light into the mind and heart of the blind man; and as a result of this, the blind man believed.

Faith helps us to see things differently. Faith, like love, is the way to see. We have a saying that "love is blind." When we see unusual partners together, like a beautiful woman going for an ugly looking man or vice versa, we hear people saying what does this woman see in that man or that man see in this woman? And with a shrug people respond, "Love is blind." I think it is a mistake to think that love is blind. Love, and love alone, can see the wonderful qualities in a human person which those without love fail to perceive. Love gives vision, a deeper way of seeing. Faith is similar to that. Faith, and faith alone, can truly see all the wonders of God. We see in today's Gospel Jesus giving sight to the man who had been born blind. The Pharisees who heard and saw the blind man, who now could see, looked at Jesus and could see him only as someone who is a trouble maker, and who broke the Sabbath law. Jesus was guilty in their judgment. They rejected him and his actions, though he did only good, and never evil. On the other hand, the man who had been healed of his blindness looked at Jesus and saw him as his Savior.

Jesus' miracle in today's Gospel is a symbol of faith, and we all have received this same gift of faith at our Baptism, the faith which is the light of Christ. This light helps us see the truth, justice and righteousness. This light helps us to experience joy and happiness amidst pain and suffering. This light enables us to emerge from the tombs of sin and death, and into the light of Christ. St. Paul in the second reading says, "Brothers and Sisters, you were once in darkness, but now you are light in the Lord", which means that now we are enlightened by Christ. It is good to ask ourselves, "Do we live like enlightened people? Do we live like people who have the light of Christ within us? Or, are we still in darkness though we have been washed in Baptism?"

We are in darkness whenever we are imprisoned in our egoism, whenever we refuse to accept others as they are, whenever we sow the seeds of enmity, or whenever we discard the poor and needy and fail to see Jesus' presence in them. If we are in darkness, do we desire to come out of it and come to the light? It is possible that we prefer to be in darkness, rather than coming into the light of Christ. Is our faith so weak that we cannot see the light and goodness beyond the situations that we are in? Lent is a time to garner courage to face the darkness, to go through those moments in faith so that we can see the light and begin to walk in the light of the risen Christ. Pray today for the grace that we are able to experience the light of Christ in our life, so that we can bear fruit worthy of the light.


St. John the Baptist's Women's Ministry Committee Meeting on March 23rd at 6:30pm


