Dear Parishioners.

While working as a Missionary, in the State of Rajastan, India, I had an opportunity to meet a lady named Dr. Mary Grey. While chatting with her over a cup of coffee, she said she was a mother of four children and had one grandchild. She is a devoted Catholic and also a learned theologian. The remarkable thing about her was the fact that she was not just moving about in the heady atmosphere of conceptual theology, but that she was involved in a project called, "Wells for India." She and her husband, Nicholas, started this project and regularly traveled to India to help the water-starved people of Rajastan. Her deep understanding of the nature of God, and her relationship with Him, seemed to automatically flow into an effective form of human concern.

This really is the central message of Jesus in today's Gospel: To love God and to love one's neighbor. It is also fundamental to being his disciple. In the Gospel, we see that one of the Pharisees really wanted to rough Jesus up, and disconcert Him when he asked, "Master, which is the greatest commandment?" Now, this seemingly naive question, from an apparently sincere seeker of the truth, was really a trap. The Jews had 613 precepts of the law and all these commands were equally binding, and there was no scope of prioritizing them. Jesus, by answering the question of his opponents, wanted to convey strongly that He was concerned about the whole of the Law and the Prophets as well. Moreover, he was also pointing out, that all of the 613 precepts of the Law and the Prophets, may be seen as expressions or clarifications of just one command LOVE: To love God and love one's neighbor as one combined unit. The whole religion hangs together on this commandment of love. It is a big relief for all of us to be free from being burdened by a whole set of rules and regulations, in the matter of religious practice. All we have to do is to love God and allow our love to flow into love for all of God's people. The letter of St. John brings out the oneness of this love when he tells us, that if we say we love God and do not love our brothers and sisters, our love of God is really a sham and we are liars.

So, what is love all about? True love is seeking the good of others. True love is really a decision to commit ourselves to seeking the good of others, promoting the interests of others, and nurturing the other's total growth to wholeness. When we make such a decision to love the other, then ulterior motives will have no place in us and we will not engage in game-playing. Our love will have no conditions attached to it and we will not set any limit to love. Obviously, we apply this understanding of love differently with regard to God and human beings. Often, we have thought of love of our neighbor mainly as a concern with individual relationships. We imagine people doling out food to the hungry, sheltering the homeless, or visiting and taking care of the sick on a one-to-one basis. In today's scenario we need to expand our idea of love to also include effective social concern. Professional social workers would suggest that doling out fish to the hungry may only help them eat for a day, but teaching them to fish will help them to eat for a lifetime. There are many unconventional ways of showing this social concern to safeguard people's rights, which is another way of expressing neighborly love. Dr. Mary Grey, as a theologian, indicates her love of God to include her social concern for the people of India. This love took her and her husband to the interior part of Rajastan, India and providing water for them. She demonstrates in a tangible way that the love of God and love of neighbor can never be separated. In fact, the two are closely connected and expressed in just one great commandment of love. The readings of this weekend are inviting us to really practice the commandment of love: Loving God and loving our fellow human beings.






