Dear Parishioners,

A thirst could be physical or spiritual; often it is both, as in the case of the unnamed woman in the Gospel today. Physically she is thirsty, and it was to satisfy that physical thirst that she came to the well day after day. She was also thirsty spiritually, and she was looking for the spiritual satisfaction which she finds when she meets Jesus. Notice the way she responds to Jesus when he said, "Whoever drinks the water that I give will never thirst again." She responded, "Sir give me this water so that I may not be thirsty or have to keep coming here to draw water." Once she opened up to Jesus, she experienced the satisfaction of her soul's desire. Isn't this the kind of experience we wish for ourselves and for everyone during this season of Lent? We call this turn-around in life conversion. However, in order for Jesus to bring this woman to conversion, to that spiritual experience, He had to break the existing boundaries. Human Society organizes itself by erecting all kinds of boundaries: national, ethnic, religious and gender. Jesus demonstrates in today's Gospel that breaking such man-made boundaries are necessary for creating conditions for one's conversion. This is exactly what Jesus does to this woman. During Jesus' time, Jews were not supposed to interact with Samaritans. Walls of prejudice were built on the foundations of ethnicity and religion, which kept them apart. Jesus broke this boundary when he asked the woman for a drink of water. She reacted by saying, "How is it that you, a Jew, ask for a drink from me, a Samaritan woman?" Jews do not have things in common with Samaritans.

That was not the only boundary broken. It was against the moral norms of the day for a man to engage in dialogue with a woman in a public place. And yet, Jesus engages this woman in the longest dialogue we have in all of the four Gospels. This action of Jesus was seen as morally objectionable by his own disciples. The Gospel says that they (the disciples) were astonished that he was speaking with a woman, but not one of them said, "What do you want?" or "Why are you speaking with her?" If Jesus were to keep the expected behavior of his day, he could not have gotten the result that we see in the Gospel. We can see that unlike the many evangelists of our own time, Jesus never tries to condemn, threaten, or intimidate the woman. Instead, he was trying to invite, challenge and affirm her, patiently trying to enlighten her and clear any doubts she may have. Why does Jesus make such a tremendous impact on this woman? For the first time in her life, she meets a man who really understands her. In her excitement, she forgets her water and physical thirst and runs back to the village inviting the villagers to meet Jesus. She was inviting them to see "a man who told me everything I have ever done." He was probably the first man who did not reject her in spite of knowing what she had done. In this moment, the convert had become a missionary bringing others to Jesus and to the joyful experience of conversion. Another interesting point that is made are the words of the Samaritan villagers that the woman brings to Jesus. They said to the woman, "It is no longer because of what you have said that we believe, for we have heard for ourselves and we know that this is truly the Savior of the world."

There are two stages in the believing or conversion process: First is believing because of what someone told us about Jesus; and second is to believe because we have come to know Jesus personally. It is okay to believe in someone because of other's words, but it is better to strengthen that belief through our own personal experience. Lent is a period when the Church invites all her children to come to Jesus personally and believe, not because someone told us, but because we have known him and experienced his love personally in our lives. I pray that this Lenten season may help each of us deepen our faith in Jesus.


