Dear Parishioners,

When I was working as an associate Pastor at Our Lady of Mercy Church in Baton Rouge, we had an additional priest with us at the rectory who was also helping with the celebration of Masses. There were people receiving communion in the hand, and on the tongue. Whenever he celebrated Mass, he refused to give communion to Parishioners who wanted to receive communion on the tongue and were kneeling. He said to one of them, "All of the other people receive communion by standing, and so you should stand up if you want me to give you communion." That became a controversy in this church parish.

I met a man who told me he had declared war on his pastor because he allowed people to receive communion in the hand standing, rather than on the tongue and kneeling. "They are denying the real presence," he argued. "If they knew that they are actually receiving Christ, they would kneel to receive Him." In response, I asked him, "What would you do if Jesus appeared to you today?" "Oh," he said, "I would immediately fall on my knees." "Good," I responded, "There are people who would simply throw themselves on Him out of sheer joy and love for Him. Would you say that such people are irrelevant?" He kept quiet for a moment as he began to see that it was probably less a question of how we receive Jesus in the Eucharist, and more of a question of one's personal relationship and faith-approach to Jesus.

Today's Gospel gives us two models of personal relationships to Jesus: one is as a servant, and the other as a friend. And at any given point in our faith-journey, one of these two models is predominant. Either we see our relationship with Jesus mainly in terms of master to servant, or in terms of friend to friend. The traditional lay spirituality in the Church has followed the master-servant model. Jesus is seen more as a master to be feared, respected and obeyed, rather than as a friend to love in intimacy and familiarity. Today's Gospel challenges us to rethink our relationship with Christ. Because, evidently Christ himself prefers to relate with His disciples on a friend to friend basis, rather than master to servant. Jesus says, "I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but, I have called you friends." He in fact tells them that He would no longer call them servants.

Our relationship with Christ goes through different stages. First it starts off as a master-servant relationship when we are new to the faith; but then as our relationship with Christ deepens, it changes into a less formal friend to friend type of relationship. Why do so many of us still stick to the master-servant way of relating to Christ as if it were the only way? Today's Gospel is calling us to move beyond the infant stage, the servant-master relationship, and move on to the adult stage, the friend-to-friend way of relating to Christ. This will change the way we pray, and the way we live. We should begin to pray better and to experience more peace and joy in our lives, as people do who are in love. In such relationships, all of the spiritual things we do become a joy for us, and we do them because we love Jesus, and not as a fulfilment of an obligation, or because of the fear of hell, or for some other reason.

One of the objections raised by those who promote the master-servant model in relating to Christ, is that we are unworthy. Sure enough, we are not worthy. Jesus has already taken that into consideration. He reminds us that, "You did not choose Me, but I chose you." If He decides to choose us in our unworthiness, and to love and accept us as we are, then we should not fix our gaze on ourselves and ask, "Who am I Lord that you should love me?" Rather, we should fix our gaze on Him and ask, "Who are you Lord, that you love me so much?" Just as God showed His love for us by sending His Son to die for us, we have to show our love for God by keeping the ten commandments: love of God and neighbor. By doing this we know we are truly Christ's friends, for Jesus says, "You are My friends if you do what I command you." God loves us as we are. God loves us too much to leave us as we are, He wants us to grow up. We love babies as they are, but we want them to grow up. God is like that; He wants us to grow in His love. Pray that we may continue to grow in His love.




May Crowning at the Grotto
