
Dear Parishioners,

Both the first reading and the Gospel of this weekend are beautiful examples of God's love. In the first reading, we hear that God gave the people of Israel His love, His friendship, and His beautiful vineyard to tend; but they rejected God's friendship and betrayed His love. It hurt God so deeply that He complained, "What more was there to do for my people than I had not done?" In the Gospel, we have another example of God's love. He gave the vineyard to the tenants to take care of. However, they were not responsible and they were not grateful of God's offer. They even mistreated those whom God sent to correct, and bring them back to Him. God's love is long and enduring, hence he sent his own Son hoping that they would respect and honor Him. Nonetheless, they abused and killed his son. This shows no matter how far we wander away; he gently seeks us out and brings us back to Himself. This compassionate love of God toward us has to be an example of what we should do to one another.

The vineyard in today's readings, refers to the community of God's people. Both Prophet Isaiah and Jesus invite us to examine the state of our vineyard. The vineyard is our community. The concept of community can extend from the small intimate setting of a family, to a circle of friends, or to a gathering as large as our parish Community. It can be the Church as a whole or it can be the world, an image of an all-embracing community of God's people on earth. No matter what size the community is, it can bear good fruit only when the members of that community live in loving and caring relationships with one another. The culture in which we live today threatens the possibility for communities to live in love; which prevents the members from bearing good fruit. Today, communities break down because the members often fail to build and nurture relationships between themselves. We desire to bear good fruit but, with good intentions, we allow ourselves to be pulled in too many directions. We become distracted and fail to focus on what really matters. As a result, relationships become stressed. We fail to follow up on our commitments, and when things happen unexpectedly, we lose our patience. Consequently, the vineyard, instead of producing good fruit, produces wild grapes of violence and injustice. This violence flourishes when people are isolated, ignored or alienated.

Violence often happens in communities that do not care for one another, where people don't feel loved and accepted, where their voices are suppressed, where feelings are not communicated or where they are not supported to become what God has called them to be. We do violence to one another and to ourselves when we shift our priorities from relationships to things that are less important. We succumb to violence when our greed blinds us to the reality of the suffering of our poor brothers and sisters in need. As St. Paul tells us, we must direct our lives toward, "whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is gracious." Paul encourages the community to put aside its preoccupations, because all that really matters is how we live in our relationship with God and with others. We can say that a community begins when it recognizes God's presence within itself and within others. We must learn to care for the community of our family, the community of our parish and the community of our world. When we learn to live in loving relationships with others, the vineyard of our communities will in turn bear quality fruit. Today let us thank the Lord for trusting us, and entrusting us with the vineyards of our family, our society and our world. Let us ask ourselves, "Are we tending to the vineyard the Lord has entrusted to us responsibly, by living in love, by caring for one another, and by caring for our world?" Let us pray that the Lord will help us to live responsibly in the vineyard he has entrusted to us and bear the fruit expected of us.




October is the month of the Rosary


